
When: Horizon High School is having a Fall Festival Fundraiser and celebration of our 18th Anniversary on Wednesday, September 21st at Goodman Community Center.

Bucky Book 2022

STOC is once again selling Bucky Books to help raise funds for our foundation. Each book sells for \$35 with \$15 of that coming back to the club in profit. There are hundreds of buy one get one free coupons for things such as restaurants, golf, and entertainment. Use a couple of coupons and you easily get your money back while supporting a great cause.

Our Bucky Book sales campaign is winding down. We currently have 53 books out to members with cash received for 35. I turned in what was left of our original supply of 60 yesterday and received 6 free books where we will make \$35 profit per book. Those came from two members selling 10 Bucky Books and two others selling 5 Bucky Books - Our top 6 sellers have sold 40 books! Great Job! Unfortunately, that means our other 32 members have sold a grand total of 13 books!

SAUK TRAILS OPTIMIST CLUB

Board of Directors Meeting Tuesday, October 18, 2022; MINUTES

PRESENT: John Fons, Carole Klopp, Bob Wortinger, Kathy Johnson, Rick Thomas, Mary

Wykle, Jane Meyer, Rick Conne, Steve Bailey, and Ted See

ABSENT: Mark Kraemer

The meeting was called to order via Zoom at 5:03pm.

- 1. Welcome/ Agenda Additions (Steve Bailey was on time)
- 2. September Board Meeting Minutes: Steve moves to approve, Bob seconds, motion passes unanimously.
- 3. Financial Report End of September 2022
 - a. <u>Balance Sheet</u>: Checking operating cash balance is \$3029 with cash equivalents of \$4,222.95 Foundation cash equivalents came in at \$11,514.39.
 - b. <u>Income Statement</u> we ended the fiscal year with a net operating profit of \$90.48. All grants from the Foundation were paid out in September. NOTES: we spent about \$25/week for speakers. SWIS district expenses exceeded the budget, but we received a donation to offset the overage. Vanguard earnings were negative with Football Crazr fundraiser coming in above projection at \$12 per 65 tickets sold. Finally, we lost a net of 6 members during the 2021-22 fiscal year and are starting the new year with 38 members.

Carole moves to accept the final 2021-22 statements, Kathy seconds, motion passes unanimously.

- c. <u>Fundraising</u>: Bucky Books update original order of 60 handed out 52, cash in for 32 so cash for 20 books is still outstanding. We should have 6 free books coming in. It was agreed by consensus for members to turn in any leftover books and cash collected soon. The goal is to be done with this fundraiser by the end of October. We should clear a profit of about \$1000.
- 4. 2022-2023 Budget: proposed budget has a negative balance of -\$1100. The loss of 6 members (6x40x4 =\$950) represents most of our loss for this year. Losing one member equals a \$160 loss. Lunches should be a wash as we are billing \$15 and being charged \$14.50. Projected revenues are down \$300. OI annual dues went up \$15 per member as of 10.1.2022 and are now \$21 per member annually. Carole asks if we shouldn't raise our dues \$3.75 per member per quarter. Bob said we are already one of the highest in our district. In response to Kathy's question, Bob replied that dues can be increased at any time. We would be talking going to \$44 or \$45. John suggested that we use this opportunity during the first quarter to introduce a possible increase in dues to the membership and give them time to digest it. Carole moves to increase the quarterly dues to \$45 effective with the second quarter dues billing. Rick C seconds the motion. Motion passes unanimously. Bob suggested tabling the budget to the November meeting to give Bob and John time to rework the budget taking into account the dues increase. John tabled the budget by consensus.
- 5. Sauk Trails Newsletter: Bonnie has agreed to remain the Newsletter Editor and send out the next one on October 29th.
- 6. General Meeting Frequency: Discussed moving to every other week. Is the budget impact pertinent to this discussion? Bob said it would be tough to predict speaker meals and member attendance. We only had 15 guest lunches last year. John would like to wait on making a decision on this right now. Rick C. felt we might have more people at the meetings going to every other week. Bob said that we did have more people this summer when we went to every other week (starting in June 14, 11, 10, 11; July 16, 11; August 15, 9; Sept 10, 9, 9, 7). First October meeting was 14. John feels we should leave things right now and will put it on the agenda in future. We need to connect with the restaurant to see if they have a required minimum number of attendees. Discussion tabled.
- 7. New Business: Some goals: we would like to seek out other club activities, have more guests and members at meetings, and possibly create a club within a club at Oakwood Village (we would need to invite some of the Oakwood residents to our meetings). Jane works at Oakwood PT and indicated there is interest. John will discuss with Oakwood staff. Breeze Stevens concerts Kathy would like to pursue this and be in charge. Carole will email Steve Britt, president of the Middleton Club, to get more information as to how this happened.
- 8. Adjournment: Kathy moves to adjourn to November 15, 2022 at 5pm, Steve seconds, motion passes unanimously.

We stand adjourned to Tuesday, November 15, 2022 at 5pm on Zoom.
